Michael Jackson

Michael Jackson was a singer, dancer and actor. He was born on 29th August 1958, in a city near Chicago. He was the eighth of ten children. His father, Joseph, was a musician in a band called *The Falcons*.

Michael was the singer and song writer for *The Jacksons*. The other singers in the band were Michael's brothers. Their best-selling single was *I Want You Back* in 1969. Michael's 1982 album *Thriller* was number one in the USA for thirty-seven weeks. Michael was married twice. His death, on 25th June 2009, was on the front page of newspapers all around the world.

Grace Kelly

Grace Kelly was an actor and a princess. She was born on 12th November 1929, in Philadelphia. Her first film was *Fourteen Hours* in 1951. She was also in *Rear Window* in 1954 and *High Society* in 1956. Grace and Prince Rainier III of Monaco were married in the same year. After that her name was the Princess of Monaco or Princess Grace. Her death in a car crash, on 14th September 1982, was a big news story.
